COMMUNITY MESSAGE FROM BOARD CHAIR AND REGIONAL LIBRARIAN



Libraries are widely known as places where stories are discovered and told. The pages that follow tell a story of resilience, community connection, innovation, and guite simply kindness. There is no surprise ending but some twists and turns along the way that demonstrate the true spirit of modern libraries as valuable community assets. As the library of today continues to evolve, so does our story, and the best element is that you write the plot.

As COVID took hold, CBRL entered a lockdown of our physical spaces. Library staff instinctively pivoted to engagement from a distance. During the closure, CBRL offered virtual programs and launched new e-resources. Library staff delivered story times and puppet shows from their living rooms. We facilitated Book Clubs and Newcomer Conversation Circles via Zoom. Library staff met every challenge and newly required skill set with resilience and tact.

We know that libraries help build strong communities. This year CBRL welcomed 1400 new members to the Library. Further proof that people look to their public library during difficult times. CBRL did our part to help people stay healthy and connected. We launched our first ever Seed Library, filling close to 800 seed orders delivered to homes throughout CBRM and Victoria County.

In addition, a community cupboard was put in place in the Baddeck Library with the help of funds from the NS Health Authority's Community Health Boards. We also launched programs such as Kids in The Kitchen and Snacks-to-Go. all focusing on healthy living and food literacy.

Although our success stories were many, unfortunately there were patrons we were unable to serve without being opened, COVID revealed the depth of inequities many people experience everyday—whether it is access to technology or basic necessities such as public washrooms. Vulnerable populations rely heavily on their Library and

without access to our physical spaces we knew our reach was limited. When our physical spaces reopened, programs and services were reimagined that helped address these inequities. Public libraries, including CBRL, have proven to play an essential role in the community, as we continually expand our role beyond lending books.

This year a third library study was completed related to the replacement of the Sydney Library. The Service, Programs and Operational Plan (SPOP) further articulated the services and programs required in a new central library, providing an in-depth look at capital costs and ongoing operating costs for CBRM to maintain this important municipal service. Building on the previous studies, the SPOP further reinforces the need for community space and an increased footprint in order to deliver barrier-free collections, programs, and services to all citizens in our region.

CBRL is grateful for the many partnerships we have within our communities and acknowledge that our endeavors would not be possible without these important collaborations.

To the staff at Provincial Library, CBRM and Victoria County, thank you for your continued support.

IRCC English Conversation Groups at CBRL

One of the most rewarding projects we worked on as a team during the first lockdown was reaching out to our patrons via phone calls. It added an element of human contact that we were all missing and it provided a way to let our patrons know we were thinking of them. Some calls were quick check-ins, and others turned into longer conversations about how we were feeling and coping with the isolation. For many of our patrons, the library may be their only point of contact—it's often part of their weekly or even daily routines to see familiar faces and exchange a few words ...and it was as good for us as it was for them! Months later, when we reopened, many of our regulars commented on how nice it was to have that one-on-one conversation and they were thankful for the efforts that were put forth. It was just one more way to stay connected during such a difficult time.

All branches of CBRL were abruptly closed on March 16th. Among the many serious challenges presented by COVID-19, imposing distance while remaining connected, was one we needed to master somehow. Staff rose admirably to the challenge of staying safe and staying connected. They displayed a truly remarkable and instinctual "need to help" by quickly working from their kitchen tables instead of usual work spaces within their library branches. Programs and services were adapted and delivered, which brought comfort and reassurance during such unprecedented times. Working collaboratively with our colleagues across Nova Scotia, barriers such as library fines were quickly removed and WiFi access remained accessible from outside our closed doors.

Library staff seamlessly moved into the uncharted territory of virtual programs. We successfully launched new services like:

CBRL's Seed Library, an initiative focused on gardening and food literacy. A total of 800 seed packages were delivered to households in CBRM and Victoria County.





I found myself thinking about the families stuck at home, and how disorienting the experience was proving for children. On a personal level, I was feeling incredibly cut off from my patrons and my community and felt a strong need to make contact. I began offering a morning "Wee Ones Online" via Facebook Live (with stories, songs, puppets, crafts... and at one point, a lamb) so that local kids could see a familiar and trusted face every day. I thought the routine might be helpful - both to the viewers, and to me! Each afternoon, I offered an "Afternoon Story time" session in which I read a chapter of a book out loud for anyone who cared to listen. These sessions ended up being a powerful way to connect with people, to share stories and feelings, and to add some structure to life in lockdown.

Freeman Collection

The restrictions associated with COVID-19 have provided the opportunity for staff to spend more time on the Freeman Collection.

The Freeman Collection, purchased by the Cape Breton Regional Library from a second hand bookseller in Halifax, Nova Scotia, consists of various papers, letters, photos and other ephemera produced by Charles Freeman and his family. Staff are working on transcribing the three binders of reports sent by Charles Freeman to the U.S. State Department in Washington D.C. The reports date from the period that Freeman served as the U.S. Consul in Sydney, Nova Scotia (1911-1924). The Freeman family consisted of Charles Freeman, his wife Susan, and their daughters, Harriet and Mary.

Once transcribed, these documents will be made available online and will be of great interest to local historians, as well as researchers from around the world.

When public health restrictions began to ease in June, library staff returned to their physical locations and began planning for the safe delivery of library services. This was new territory for all of us with our number 1 priority being the health and safety of staff and patrons.

- CBRL developed a multi-phased Pandemic Reopening Plan in adherence with Public Health protocols.
- As a first step we launched our contactless service, Library Take-Out in all CBRL branches.
- CBRL supplied 30,000 face masks to the people of CBRM and Victoria County

On July 14th we re-opened our doors.

As the seasons changed and with capacity limits in effect inside our locations, library staff once again found new ways to connect. We brought our programs outdoors where we could safely enjoy each other's company.

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Food Literacy

As a recipient of the Province of Nova Scotia's Building Vibrant Communities grant, CBRL launched FoodSmart in Cape Breton with the goal of addressing food security and improving food literacy in our communities. Kids in the Kitchen, modeled after Halifax Public Libraries' food focused programs, brings families together to create healthy recipes at home. In addition to the many benefits of food literacy, children also learn math, science and language skills. Through the generous support of the FoodSmart grant, CBRL was able to coordinate the recipes and purchase all of the groceries and supplies necessary for families to make healthy meals at home.

Digital Literacy


As we re-imagined library services it was important that CBRL continue to combat the digital exclusion that was exacerbated by the COVID-19 lockdown. We are here to help, whether it's setting up an email address or learning how to use your smartphone.

CBRL resumed our popular 1-on-1 tech help and launched TechConnect for the first time. This new initiative was made possible through a partnership with Victoria County Home Support Services and Victoria County Senior's Safety Program. TechConnect provided seniors living in Victoria County with devices, connectivity, skills support, and transit passes enabling them access to their Library.

TechConnect is a perfect example of the much needed collaborations across organizations that improve the overall health and well-being of our communities.
























IAN MACINTOSH

Ian MacIntosh, a member of our CBRL family passed away on May 22, 2021.

Ian was dedicated, highly respected, and much admired within Nova Scotia's library community. He held the title of Regional Librarian at CBRL from 1982-2004. After 22 years at the helm, Ian assumed the role of Collections Librarian. He retired in 2019.

All who interacted with Ian in any capacity, would agree that his greatest gift as a leader, as an innovator, and as an administrator, was his humanity and concern for others. As a colleague, library staff described Ian as incredibly helpful, humorous, kind and supportive. Ian was instrumental in creating the culture of caring service that CBRL is known for and so effortlessly demonstrated over the past year.
